Over fifty years ago, the Pratt began as the Homer Society for Natural History, a forum for community members to gather and share their passion for the science, cultures and art of the Kachemak Bay region. Eventually, a museum was built and from this vibrant gathering place, Kachemak Bay's history has been studied, documented, preserved and most importantly shared with thousands of students, residents and visitors from across Alaska and around the world.

Today, the Pratt's collections include over 24,000 objects, specimens, artifacts, works of art and more. Our outdoor botanical exhibits and trails provide living examples of the biodiversity on which the region depends economically, culturally and biologically; as well as spaces for education, recreation and quiet contemplation. Our exhibitions and programs reflect the community's interest in its past, as well as a desire to shape the future through deeper understanding.

Thank you to our members, volunteers, partners, friends and visitors for the essential ingredients of time, money and love. For decades before and hopefully for decades more to come, you are the lifeblood of this community's museum.
