Term: Full Time. Exempt position. Employment may be terminated or

extended at the will of the Pratt Museum.

Schedule: Generally, Monday – Friday 8:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m. As needed with

weekends included.

Wage: \$40,000 - \$60,000

Benefits: As determined by Pratt Museum Personnel Policy, including paid time off,

Health Insurance, and matching contribution, up to 3% in an IRA.

Reports to: Executive Director

Supervises: Interns and volunteers

Employer: The Pratt Museum will contribute to the State Unemployment fund for the employee and will provide Worker's Compensation to cover the employee in case of a work-related injury.

Position Overview: Plan, and supervise a range of programs and co-curricular opportunities that enrich and expand the educational mission of Pratt Museum. The position plays a key role through creative engagement with our diverse constituent communities, on-campus and beyond, through innovative programming.

Essential Job Functions

- Plans education programs with the goal of encouraging lifelong learning and exploration of the Kachemak Bay region among participants of all ages. Activities may encompass:
 - o Interpretive tours with the public
 - School group visits with directed or self-guided activities
 - o Offsite programs such as classroom visits and senior center presentations
 - o Educational programs for underserved families with young children
 - o Traveling education kits and printed materials such as gallery guides
 - Summer visitor programs and high school or college internships
 - o Docent training program, special events, lectures, workshops
- Works as part of the program team along with the Curator of Exhibits and





Collections, contribute interpretive strategies.

- Plans and participates in outreach events in the community and schools
- Ensures ongoing evaluation for education programs; tracks and reports education program statistics.
- Collaborates with Museum partners in the development and delivery of cooperative educational programs.
- Contributes to writing and managing grants designated to education and public programs.
- Leads regular tours and coordinated Tour Guide Program.
- Works with staff and volunteers to accomplish the mission of the Museum.
- Other duties as assigned.

Education: Master's degree in Museum Studies/Education.

Substitutions- The following combination of education and experience may substitute for the required master's degree in Museum Studies/Education:

Master's degree in Art History, Humanities, Archeology, Anthropology, Education or equivalent field as determined by the Museum Director AND one (1) year of experience working in museums.

OR

Bachelor's degree from an accredited college including some coursework in museology; art, anthropology, education, archaeology, history, or a closely related field, AND two (2) years of experience working in a museum.

Job Requirements:

- Experience in planning and delivering education programs for all age groups.
- Experience working with Alaska Native communities and cultural information willingness to learn more and work with Alaska Native culture-bearers.
- Knowledge of the objectives, curricula, and operation of local area school systems and other educational institutions
- Grant writing skills preferred
- Ability to work effectively with the public and be responsive to changing needs of the community.
- Excellent verbal and written communication skills.
- High degree of organizational skills and the ability to handle multiple projects in





various stages of development.

- Demonstrated ability to proactively prioritize and manage time, juggle multiple duties and tasks, and meet deadlines.
